Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

Jesus told her, "I am the resurrection and the life; whoever believes in me, even if he dies, will live, and everyone who lives and believes in me will never die. Do you believe this?" (John 11:25-26)

On behalf of the clergy, staff, and parishioners at Saint Rose of Lima, I would like to extend our deepest condolences at the death of your loved one. Losing someone is never easy, which is why we are here to help you in this difficult time.

In today's increasingly secular society, the value of a Funeral Mass can easily be overlooked. We are, indeed, here to comfort one another in this time of sorrow, but we come primarily with the intention of praying for our brother or sister; to offer them an important work of mercy at a time when it greatly benefits them. The *Catechism of the Catholic Church* teaches:

The Church who, as Mother, has borne the Christian sacramentally in her womb during his earthly pilgrimage, accompanies him at his journey's end, in order to surrender him "into the Father's hands." She offers to the Father, in Christ the child of his grace, and she commits to the earth, in hope, the seed of the body that will rise in glory. This offering is fully celebrated in the Eucharistic sacrifice... (CCC 1683)

We can do no greater service for the faithful departed than to offer Christ himself upon the altar, during the Holy Sacrifice of the Mass. Therefore, for those who have died in the Lord, offering a Mass for the repose of their soul is the single greatest act that we, the living, may do to aid them in their final preparations to receive their Eternal Reward.

In anticipation of the funeral, we have created this packet to address questions you may have regarding the order of worship, music, and readings, and honoraria. Please read it carefully.

Order of Worship

Introductory Rites

The Funeral begins in the back of the church. The Priest sprinkles holy water, blesses the casket/cremains, and a Pall (symbol of the deceased's Baptism), is placed over the casket.

Processional

The body of the deceased is brought into the church as the Priest and Ministers enter.

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Homily

The Priest will deliver a sermon pertaining to the Paschal Mysteries of Christ.

Prayers of the Faithful

We offer communal prayers for specific intentions.

Offertory

The gifts of Bread and Wine are brought to the altar.

Consecration

The Priest blesses the Bread and Wine, turning it into the Body, Blood, Soul, and Divinity of Jesus Christ.

The Lord's Prayer

Together we recite the prayer, "Our Father, who art in heaven..."

Communion

Catholics in a state of grace are invited to come forward for reception of the Eucharist. If you are not Catholic or not in a state of grace, you may remain seated or come forward for a blessing from the Priest or Deacon.

Final Commendation

The Priest incenses the body or the cremains.

Recessional

The Mass concludes. The Priest and Ministers exit the church in procession with the body and proceed to the cemetery.

Some other points:

- 1. During the Introductory Rites and Processional, immediate family members of the deceased are invited to process into the church with the Priest, Ministers, and the body.
- 2. At the Offertory, a few people are welcome to bring the gifts of Bread and Wine forward to the altar.
- 3. Eulogies and stories are wonderful things to share with others; however, as our primary purpose in the Funeral Mass is to offer prayers for the deceased, these are not appropriate to share at that time.

 Remembrances are better-suited to the Wake or Bereavement Meal.
- 4. The Church will create handouts with the Order of Worship, readings, and music in them to help people especially those who may not be Catholic follow along.
- 5. **Important**: If your loved one has been cremated, the remains **must** be interned in consecrated grounds (i.e., a cemetery or mausoleum.) <u>Under no circumstance</u> is it permissible to spread the remains over the earth or water, nor does the Church permit you to take the ashes home.

Readings

- 1. There are three readings during the Mass: one from the Old Testament, one from the New Testament, and one from the Gospels.
- 2. You may choose to have a reader from those attending the funeral, provided that (s)he has been a Lector at Catholic Masses before. Should that not be the case or you prefer not to, the church is able to provide a Lector.
- 3. If you would like to select the readings for the funeral, please pick an Old and New Testament passage. The Priest normally choses the Gospel, but you may suggest one from the selections provided.
 - a. NOTE: during Eastertide, the Old Testament reading is replaced by a passage from the Acts of the Apostles or the Book of Revelation. These options are at the end of the *Old Testament Readings* section.
- 4. Readings may only be selected from those listed below.
- 5. If you prefer not to select readings altogether or are unsure about which ones to pick, the Church is happy to do that for you.

Music

If you have any questions, concerns, or requests for music at the Funeral Mass, please let us know.

The fee of \$250 for music at the service covers the organist or pianist and the Cantor and can be made payable to Saint Rose Catholic Church.

Music

With regard to sacred music at the Funeral Mass, the Church has very specific points she requires us to keep in mind:

Sacred music has an integral role in the funeral rites....[it] should express the Paschal Mystery and the Christian's share in it....Secular music, even though it may reflect on the background, character, interests, or personal preferences of the deceased or mourners, is not appropriate for the Sacred Liturgy (Sing to the Lord 246).

Music should never be used to memorialize the deceased, but rather to give praise to the Lord, whose Paschal Sacrifice has freed us from the bonds of death (Sing to the Lord 248).

Certainly no one will be astonished that the Church is so vigilant and careful about sacred music. It is not a case of drawing up laws of aesthetics or technical rules that apply to the subject of music. It is the intention of the Church, however, to protect sacred music against anything that might lessen its dignity, since it is called upon to take part in something as important as divine worship (*Musicae Sacrae* 21).

To that end, St. Rose has established several guidelines and points of consideration for music during the funeral:

- 1. Music will be provided by the musicians of Saint Rose. There will be an Organist and Cantor
- 2. The Catholic Mass contains music throughout. At the beginning of the Mass, we sing the Introit, which in English is "Eternal rest grant unto them..." Similarly, we sing a psalm, Final Commendation ("Saints of God...") and Recessional ("May angels lead you into paradise...") whose texts are provided by the church.
- 3. The Church is happy to put together a beautiful and appropriate selection of music for the funeral if you are unsure about what to pick or simply would prefer not to. If, however, you would like to select songs, you may pick two from the list below, which may be sung at either or both of the Offertory and Communion:

Old Testament Readings

C1 2 Maccabees 12:43-46

A reading from the second Book of Maccabees

Judas, the ruler of Israel, took up a collection among all his soldiers, amounting to two thousand silver drachmas, which he sent to Jerusalem to provide for an expiatory sacrifice. In doing this he acted in a very excellent and noble way, inasmuch as he had the resurrection of the dead in view; for if he were not expecting the fallen to rise again, it would have been useless and foolish to pray for them in death. But if he did this with a view to the splendid reward that awaits those who had gone to rest in godliness, it was a holy and pious thought. Thus he made atonement for the dead that they might be freed from this sin.

C2 Job 19:1, 23-27a

A reading from the Book of Job

Job answered Bildad the Shuhite and said: Oh would that my words were written down! Would that they were inscribed in a record: that with an iron chisel and with a lead they were cut in the rock forever! But as for me, I know that my Vindicator lives, and that he will at last stand forth upon the dust; whom I myself shall see: my own eyes, not another's shall behold him; and from my flesh I shall see god; my inmost being is consumed with longing.

C3 Wisdom 3:1-9 (long version)

A reading from the Book of Wisdom

The souls of the just are in the hand of God, and no torment shall touch them. They seemed, in the view of the foolish, to be dead; and their passing away was thought an affliction and their going forth from us, utter destruction. But they are in peace. For if before men, indeed, they be punished, yet is theirs full of immortality; chastised a little, they shall be greatly blessed, because God tried them and found them worthy of himself. As gold in the furnace, he proved them, and as sacrificial offerings he took them to himself. The Lord God will wipe away the tears from all faces; the reproach of his people he will remove from the whole earth; for the Lord has spoken. On that day it will be said: "Behold our God, to whom we looked to save us! This is the Lord for whom we looked; let us rejoice and be glad that he has saved us!"

C6 Lamentations 3:17-26

A reading from the Book of Lamentations

My soul is deprived of peace, I have forgotten what happiness is; I tell myself my future is lost, all that I hoped for from the Lord. The thought of my homeless poverty is wormwood and gall; remembering it over and over leaves my soul downcast within me. But I will call this to mind, as my reason to have hope: the favors of the Lord are not exhausted, his mercies are not spent; they are renewed each morning, so great is his faithfulness. My portion is the Lord, says my soul; therefore will I hope in him. Good is the Lord to one who waits for him, to the soul that seeks him; it is good to hope in silence for the saving help of the Lord.

C7 Daniel 12:1-3

A reading from the Book of the Prophet Daniel

Eastertide Replacements for the Old Testament Reading

C8 Acts of the Apostles 10:34-43 (long Version) (This reading is during Eastertide only)

A reading from the Acts of the Apostles

Peter proceeded to speak, saying: "In truth, I see that God shows no partiality. Rather, in every nation who ever fears him and acts uprightly is acceptable to him. You know the word that he sent to the children of Israel as he proclaimed peace through Jesus Christ, who is Lord of all, what has happened all over Judea, beginning in Galilee after the baptism that John preached, how God anointed Jesus of Nazareth with the Holy Spirit and power. He went about doing good and healing all those oppressed by the Devil, for God was with him. We are witnesses of all that he did both in the country of the Jews and in Jerusalem. They put him to death by hanging him on a tree. This man God raised on the third day and granted that he be visible, not to all the people, but to us, the witnesses chosen by God in advance, who ate and drank with him after he rose from the dead. He commissioned us to preach to the people and testify that he is the one appointed by God as judge of the living and the dead. C8(b) Acts of the Apostles 10:34-36, 42-43 (short version) (This reading is during Eastertide only)

C10 Revelation 20:11-21:1 (This reading is during Eastertide only)

A reading from the Book of Revelation

I, John, saw a large white throne and the one who was sitting on it. The earth and the sky fled from his presence and there was no place for them. I saw the dead, the great and the lowly, standing before the throne, and the scrolls were opened. Then another scroll was opened, the book of life. The dead were judged according to their deeds, by what was written in the scrolls. The sea gave up its dead; then Death and Hades gave up their dead. All the dead were judged according to their deeds. Then Death and Hades were thrown into the pool of fire is the second death.) Anyone whose name was not found written in the book of life was thrown into the pool of fire. Then I saw a new heaven and a new earth. The former heaven and the former earth had passed away and the sea was no more.

C11 Revelation 21:1-5a, 6b-7 (*This reading is during Eastertide only*)

A reading from the Book of Revelation

I, John, saw a new heaven and a new earth. The former heaven and the former earth had passed away, and the sea was no more. I also saw the holy city, a new Jerusalem, coming down out of the heaven from God, prepared as a bride adorned for her husband. I heard a loud voice from the throne saying, "Behold, God'sdwelling is within the human race. He will dwell with them and they will be his people and God himself will always be with them as their God. He will wipe every tear from their eyes, and there shall be no more death or mourning, wailing or pain, for the old order has passed away." The One who sat on the throne said, "Behold, I make all things new. I am the Alpha and the Omega, the beginning and the end. To the thirsty I will give a gift from the spring of life-giving water. The victor will inherit these gifts, and I shall be his God and he will be my son."

New Testament Readings

E1 Romans 5:5-11

A reading from the Letter of Saint Paul to the Romans

Brothers and sisters: hope does not disappoint, because the love of God has been poured out into our hearts through the Holy Spirit who has been given to us. For Christ, while we were still helpless, died at the appointed time for the ungodly. Indeed, only with difficulty does one die for a just person, though perhaps for a good person one might even find courage to die. But God proves his love for us in that while we were still sinners Christ died for us. How much more then, since we are now justified by his Blood, will we be saved through him from the wrath. Indeed, if, while we were enemies, we were reconciled to God through the death of his Son, how much more, once reconciled, will we saved by his life. Not only that, but we also boast of God through our Lord Jesus Christ through whom we have no received reconciliation.

The word of the Lord.

E2 Romans 5:17-21

A reading from the Letter of Saint Paul to the Romans

Brothers and sisters: if, by the transgression of the one, death came to reign through that one, how much more will those who receive the abundance of grace and the gift of justification come to reign in life through the one Jesus Christ. In conclusion, just as through one transgression condemnation came upon all, so, through one righteous act, acquittal and life came to all. For just as through the disobedience of the one man the many were made sinners, so through the obedience of the one the many will be made righteous. The law entered in so that transgression might increase but, where sin increased, grace overflowed all the more, so that, as sin reigned in death, grace also might reign through justification for eternal life through Jesus Christ our Lord.

E3 Romans 6:3-9 (long version)

A reading from the Letter of Saint Paul to the Romans

Brothers and sisters: are you unaware that we who were baptized into Christ Jesus were baptized into his death? We were indeed buried with him through baptism into death, so that, just as Christ was raised from the dead by the glory of the Father, we too might live in newness of life. For if we have grown into union with him through a death like his, we shall also be united with him in the resurrection. We know that our old self was crucified with him, so that our sinful body might be done away with, that we might no longer be in slavery to sin. For a dead person has been absolved from sin. If, then we have died with Christ, we believe that we shall also live with him. We know that Christ, raised from the dead, dies no more; death no longer has power over him.

The word of the Lord.

E3(b) Romans 6:3-4, 8-9 (short version)

A reading from the Letter of Saint Paul to the Romans

Brothers and sisters: are you unaware that we who were baptized into Christ Jesus were baptized into his death? We were indeed buried with him through baptism into death, so that, just as Christ was raised from the dead by the glory of the Father, we too might live in newness of life. If, then we have died with Christ, we believe that we shall also live with him. We know that Christ, raised from the dead, dies no more; death no longer has power over him.

The word of the Lord.

E4 Romans 8:14-23

A reading from the Letter of Saint Paul to the Romans

Brothers and sisters: those who are led by the Spirit of God are sons of God. For you did not receive a spirit of slavery to fall back into fear, but you received a spirit of adoption through which we cry, "Abba, Father!" The Spirit itself bears witness with our spirit that we are children of God, and if children, then heirs, heirs of God and joint heirs with Christ, if only we suffer with him so that we may also be glorified with him. I consider that the sufferings of this present time are as nothing compared with the glory to be revealed for us. For creation awaits with eager expectation the revelation of the children of God; for creation was made subject to futility, not of its own accord but because of the one who subjected it, in hope that creation itself would be set free from slavery to corruption and share in the glorious freedom of the children of God. We know that all creation is groaning in labor pains even until now; and not only that, but we ourselves, who have the firstfruits of the Spirit, we also groan within ourselves as we wait for adoption, the redemption of our bodies.

The word of the Lord.

E5 Romans 8:31b-35, 37-39

A reading from the Letter of Saint Paul to the Romans

Brothers and sisters: if God is for us, who can be against us? He did not spare his own Son but handed him over for us all, will he not also give us everything else along with him? Who will bring a charge against God's chosen ones? It is God who acquits us. Who will condemn? It is Christ Jesus who died, rather, was raised, who also is at the right hand of God, who indeed intercedes for us. What will separate us from the love of Christ? Will anguish, or distress or persecution, or famine, or nakedness, or peril, or the sword? No, in all these things, we conquer overwhelmingly through him who loved us. For I am convinced that neither death, nor life, no angels, no principalities, nor present things, nor future things, nor powers, nor height, nor depth, nor any other creature will be able to separate us from the love of God in Christ Jesus our Lord.

E6 Romans 14:7-9, 10c-12

A reading from the Letter of Saint Paul to the Romans

Brothers and sisters: no one lives for oneself, and no one dies for oneself. For if we live, we live for the Lord, and if we die, we die for the Lord; so then, whether we live or die, we are the Lord's. For this is why Christ died and came to life, that he might be Lord of both the dead and the living. Why then do you judge your brother? Or you, why do you look down on your brother? For we shall all stand before the judgment seat of God; for it is written: As I live, says the Lord, every knee shall bend before me, and every tongue shall give praise to God. So then each of us shall give an accounting of himself to God.

The word of the Lord.

E7 1 Corinthians 15:20-28 (long version)

A reading from the first Letter of Saint Paul to the Corinthians

Brothers and sisters: Christ has been raised form the dead, the firstfruits of those who have fallen asleep. For since death came through a man, the resurrection of the dead came also through man. For just as in Adam all die, so too in Christ shall all be brought to life, but each one in proper order: Christ the firstfruits; then, at his coming, those who belong to Christ; then comes the end, when he hands over the Kingdom to his God and Father. For he must reign until he has put all his enemies under his feet. The last enemy to be destroyed is death, for "he subjected everything under his feet." But when it says that everything has been subjected, it is clear that it excludes the one who subjected everything to him. When everything is subjected to him, then the Son himself will also be subjected to the one who subjected everything to him, so that God may be all in all.

The word of the Lord.

E7(b) 1 Corinthians 15:20-23 (short version)

A reading from the first Letter of Saint Paul to the Corinthians

Brothers and sisters: Christ has been raised form the dead, the firstfruits of those who have fallen asleep. For since death came through a man, the resurrection of the dead came also through man. For just as in Adam all die, so too in Christ shall all be brought to life, but each one in proper order: Christ the firstfruits; then, at his coming, those who belong to Christ.

The word of the Lord.

E8 1 Corinthians 15:51-57

A reading from the first Letter of Saint Paul to the Corinthians

Brothers and sisters: behold, I tell you a mystery. We shall not all fall asleep, but we will all be changed, in an instant, in the blink of an eye, at the last trumpet. For the trumpet will sound, the dead will be raised incorruptible, and we shall be changed. For that which is corruptible must clothe itself with incorruptibility and this which is mortal clothes itself with immortality, then the word that is written shall come about: *Death is swallowed up in victory. Where, O death, is your victory? Where, O death, is your sting?* The sting of death is sin, and the power of sin is the law. But thanks be to God who gives us the victory through our Lord Jesus Christ.

E9 2 Corinthians 4:14-5:1

A reading from the second Letter of Saint Paul to the Corinthians

Brothers and sisters: we know that the One who raised the Lord Jesus will raise us also with Jesus and place us with you in his presence. Everything indeed is for you, so that the grace bestowed in abundance on more and more people may cause the thanksgiving to overflow for the glory of God. Therefore, we are not discouraged; rather, although our outer self is wasting away, our inner self is being renewed day by day. For this momentary light affliction is producing for us an eternal weight of glory beyond all comparison, as we look not to what is seen but to what is unseen; for what is seen is transitory, but what is unseen is eternal. For we know that if our earthly dwelling, a tent, should be destroyed, we have a building from God, a dwelling not made with hands, eternal in heaven.

The word of the Lord.

E10 2 Corinthians 5:1, 6-10

A reading from the second Letter of Saint Paul to the Corinthians

Brothers and sisters: we know that if our earthly dwelling, a tent, should be destroyed, we have a building from God, a dwelling not made with hands, eternal in heaven. We are always courageous, although we know that while we are at home in the body we are away from the Lord, for we walk by faith, not by sight. Yet we are courageous, and we would rather leave the body and go home to the Lord. Therefore, we aspire to pleasehim, whether we are at home or away. For we must all appear before the judgment seat of Christ, so that each may receive recompense, according to what he did in the body, whether good or evil.

The word of the Lord.

E11 Philippians 3:20-21

A reading from the Letter of Saint Paul to the Philippians

Brothers and sisters: our citizenship is in heaven, and from it we also await a savior, the Lord Jesus Christ. He will change our lowly body to conform with his glorified Body by the power that enables him also to bring all things into subjection to himself.

The word of the Lord.

E12 1 Thessalonians 4:13-18

A reading from the first letter of Saint Paul to the Thessalonians

We do not want you to be unaware, brothers and sisters, about those who have fallen asleep, so that you may not grieve like the rest, who have no hope. For if we believe that Jesus died and rose, so too will God, through Jesus, bring with him those who have fallen asleep. Indeed, we tell you this, on the word of the Lord, that we who are alive, who are left until the coming of the Lord, will surely not precede those who have fallen asleep. For the Lord himself, with a word of command, with the voice of archangel and with the trumpet of God will come down from heaven, and the dead in Christ will rise first. Then we who are alive, who are left, will be caught up together with them in the clouds to meet the Lord in the air. Thus we shall always be with the Lord. Therefore, console one another with these words.

E13 2 Timothy 2:8-13

A reading from the second Letter of Saint Paul to Timothy

Beloved: remember Jesus Christ, raised from the dead, a descendant of David: such is my Gospel, for which I am suffering, even to the point of chains, like a criminal. But the word of God is not chained. Therefore, I bear with everything for the sake of those who are chosen, so that they too may obtain the salvation that is in Christ Jesus, together with eternal glory. This saying is trustworthy: if we have died with him we shall also live with him; if we persevere we shall also reign with him. But if we deny him he will deny us. If we are unfaithful he remains faithful, for he cannot deny himself.

The word of the Lord.

E14 1 John 3:1-2

A reading from the first Letter of Saint John

Beloved: see what love the Father has bestowed on us that we may be called the children of God. Yet so we are. The reason the world does not know us is that it did not know him. G19 John 19:17-18, 25-39

A reading from the holy Gospel according to John

So they took Jesus, and, carrying the cross himself, he went out to what is called the Place of the Skull, in Hebrew, Golgotha. There they crucified him, and with him two others, one on either side, with Jesus in the middle. Standing by the cross of Jesus were his mother and his mother's sister, Mary the wife of Clopas, and Mary Magdalene. When Jesus saw his mother and the disciple whom he loved, he said to his mother, "Woman, behold, your son." Then he said to the disciple, "Behold, your mother." And from that hour the disciple took her into his home. After this, aware that everything was now finished, in order that the Scripture might be fulfilled, Jesus said, "I thirst." There was a vessel filled with common wine. So they put a sponge soaked in wine on a sprig of hyssop and put it up to his mouth. When Jesus had taken the wine, he

said, "It is finished." And bowing his head, he handed over the Spirit. Now since it was the preparation day, in order that the bodies might not remain on the cross on the Sabbath, for the Sabbath day of that week was a solemn one, the Jews asked Pilate that their legs be broken and they be taken down. SO the soldiers came and broke the legs of the first and then of the other one who was crucified with Jesus. But when they came to Jesus and saw that he was already dead, they did not break his legs, but one soldier thrust his lance into his side, and immediately Blood and water flowed out. An eyewitness has testified, and his testimony is true; he knows that he is speaking the truth, so that you also may come to believe. For this happened so that the

Scripture passage might be fulfilled: *Not a bone of it will be broken*. And again another passage says: *They will look upon him whom they have pierced*. After this, Joseph of Arimathea, secretly a disciple of Jesus for fear of the Jews, asked Pilate if he could remove the Body of Jesus. And Pilate permitted it. So he came and took his Body. Nicodemus, the one who had first come to him at night, also came bringing a mixture of myrrh and aloes weighing about one hundred pounds.
